In the most recent publication of the Center for Plant Conservation, a statement in an article caught my attention by stating "One of our greatest assets is our National Parks System". The CPC and the NPS have implemented a five-year seed and data collection on park land where they hope to identify and collect seeds from imperiled plants. These seeds will then be used for reintroductions, if possible, or saved for genetic resources.

On our recent trip to the redwoods we were made aware of plant invasives with the loss of our native plants and the efforts of the NPS to remove the invasives and reintroduce our native plants, some of which are already on the imperiled list.

This trip was such a marvelous and educational trip I hope we can do it again sometime for more of our members.

JOYCE'S GARDENING TIPS FOR OCTOBER

- This is the time of year to thatch, aerate and/or reseed lawns.
- Cool weather annuals can be planted now: pansies, snapdragons, Iceland poppies, schizanthus, primroses, primulas and calendulas (if you like them).
- Sweet peas can be sown in place.
- Check your sprinklers; the length of watering as well as the frequency can be shortened.
- Feed your roses with one last dose of fertilizer. They will bloom through October and November with that boost.
- Keep removing your spent fuchsia blossoms, fertilize and they will bloom until frost.
- 0-10-10 can be applied to azaleas, rhododendrons and camellias if you have not already done so.
- Chill your tulips for at least six weeks prior to planting.
- Narcissus should be kept in a cool place and planted late October.
- Cool weather vegetables can be planted later on this month.
- Let your begonia and dahlia tubers die down and lift before frost.
